
Writing

Remember when you painted your Starry Night picture when you were at school. Think about the colours you used and the shapes you made.


Task 1

Task 2

Look at the two pictures below. Choose your favourite and write a story about the picture imagining you have stepped into the picture. What would your character be doing? How would you feel? What can you see and hear? What adventure could you go on? Can you write a story inspired by the picture?

Art

Draw an abstract shape and change it into anything you like. This activity is inspired by The Shape Game by Anthony Browne. The Shape Game encourages children to draw any shape at all and then use their imagination to turn it into anything they feel like. You can use any materials you like from a felt-tip pens to paints, crayons or collage Have a look on the following website for some ideas for your abstract starting shape and to see what other people have done.

Have a go at the activities below. Try as many as you like.

- Play a themed Shape Game: For example, can they turn your abstract shape into an animal, a robot, a flower, a monster, a house?
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- Play the Shape Game using ink-blots: drop a blob of watered-down poster paint or coloured ink onto a sheet of paper, and then use a straw to blow it across the paper to create a random ink-blot shape. Once it is dry create a picture using felt tips.
- Play the Shape Game outdoors: go outside and use coloured chalks to play giant versions of the Shape Game on the ground
- Play the Shape Game in the sky: lie on you back in the garden and look at the clouds. What shapes or images can you spot?
- Turn your shape into an imaginary creature. Give your creature a name and draw a speech bubble and write in what your creature is saying. Then describe your creature. Does it have any special powers?
