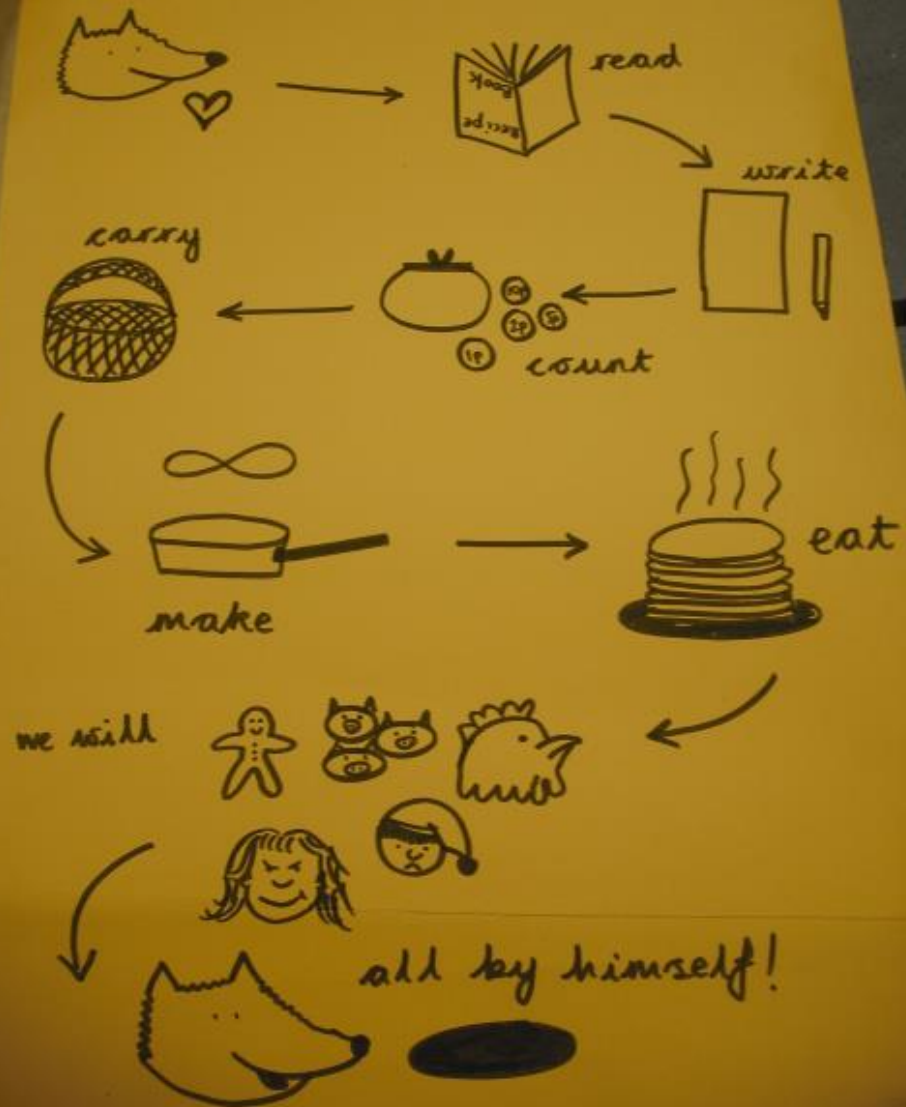

Monday 11th January 2021		<p>Watch 'Mr Wolf's Pancakes' on youtube. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=jS43aoN4jnc</p> <p>This week you are going to write your own version of the story.</p> <p>You could change the animal in the story from a wolf to something else.</p> <p>You could change the food from pancakes to your favourite food, or maybe pizza as we have just made it and you know what ingredients to write about.</p> <p>Year 2s: You may want to try changing both things.</p> <p>The rest of your story can be the same as 'Mr Wolf's Pancakes' with characters refusing to help make the recipe.</p>	<p>Make a story map for your story.</p> <p>You can make a story map by drawing pictures. There are two for 'Mr Wolf's Pancakes' at the end of this document. One is very simple and one has more detail.</p> <p>If you prefer you can make a story map using plasticene or even lego. If you do please take photos and send them to us as we love to see your ideas.</p> <p>Make sure your story map includes a beginning, a problem, a solution and an ending.</p> <p>In Mr Wolf's story these parts would be:</p> <p>Beginning: Mr Wolf wants to make pancakes.</p> <p>Problem: None of his neighbours will help him. You would need to give some details here.</p>	<p>Make sure you have mapped out each part of the story.</p> <p>This will really help when you come to write your story.</p>

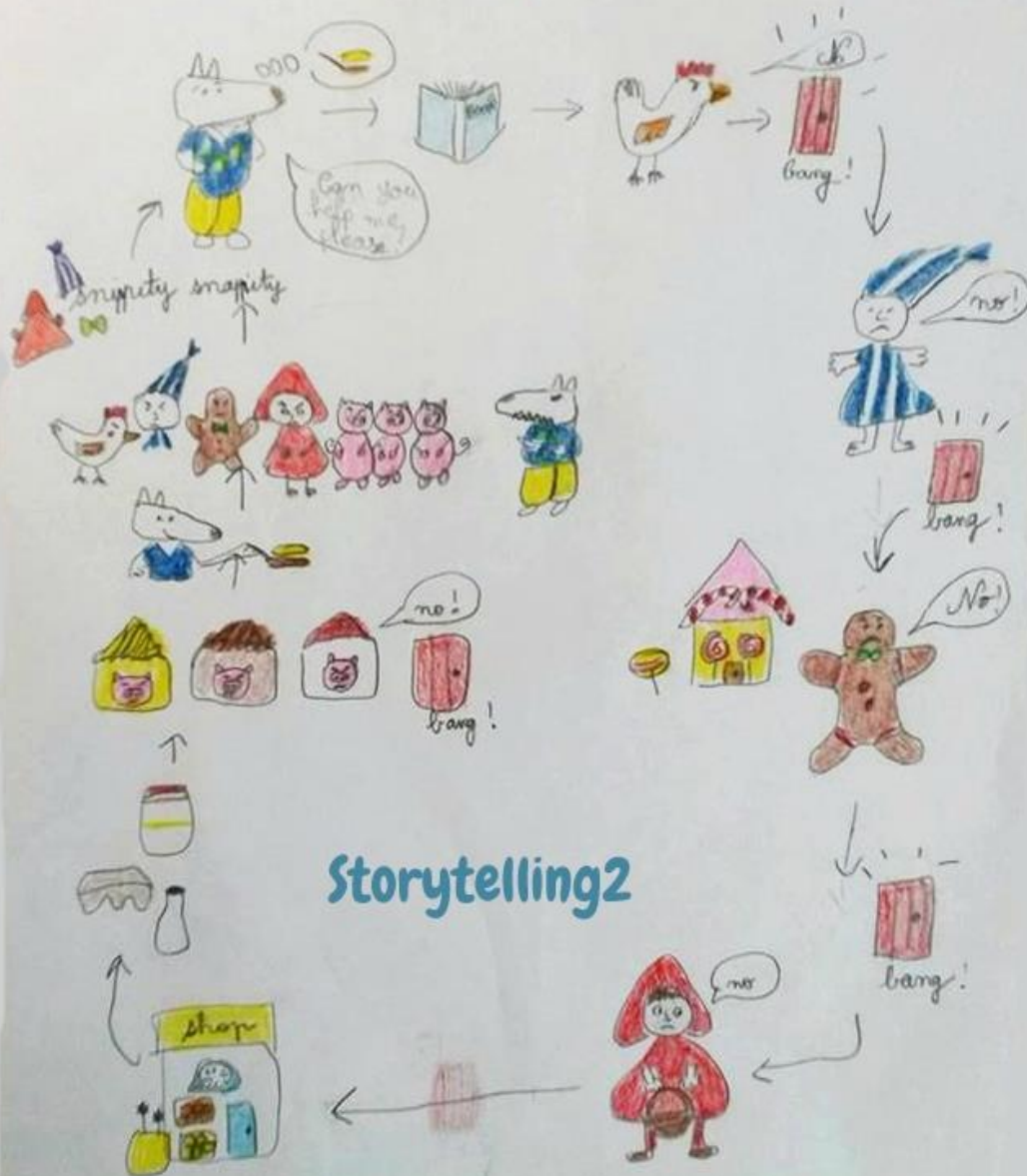
			<p>Solution: He makes the pancakes all by himself.</p> <p>Ending: He eats his neighbours, followed by the delicious pancakes.</p>	
<p>Tuesday 12th January 2021</p>	<p>To write the opening of a story by describing the main character</p>	<p>Write down some adjectives that describe your character.</p> <p>Write down some double adjectives, e.g. brown, furry bear or fierce, proud lion.</p> <p>Think about the order you would choose to write them. Does fierce, proud sound better than proud, fierce? What do you think?</p> <p>Collect as many interesting double adjectives as you can.</p>	<p>Write the beginning of your own story.</p> <p>Don't forget to use your story map from yesterday.</p> <p>How will you start your story? Once upon a time, long ago, there once lived? Or perhaps with the character's name. E.g. Mr Lion was a huge, strong lion with a long, golden main, he loved to cook and eat pizza.</p>	<p>Read your beginning.</p> <p>Does it grab the reader's attention?</p> <p>Have you used some fabulous adjectives to introduce the main character?</p>
<p>Wednesday 6th January 2021</p>	<p>To introduce the problem in the story</p> <p>To use a question mark when a character asks a question.</p>	<p>The problem is no one will help your character make his food.</p> <p>Your character will be meeting some other characters here. You can use some speech. Your character may ask his neighbours some questions. Plan some of these now. You can jot them down if you like. Remember to use question marks. We learnt about them last week.</p> <p>Tell me about who he asks and what he asks them to do?</p> <p>Look at your story map.</p>	<p>Write the next part of the story. This will be the longest, most detailed section.</p> <p>Don't forget you will need to write about the recipe, the list of ingredients and the basket.</p>	<p>Read through your work.</p> <p>Is the problem clear to the reader?</p> <p>Did you use some questions and question marks?</p>

		If you get stuck watch 'Mr Wolf's Pancakes' again to get some ideas.		
Thursday 7th January 2021	To write the solution to the problem using clear sentences.	Look at your story map. How did you plan to solve the problem? Did your character make their food all by themselves? Have you got another idea? It's ok if you have changed your mind and got a better idea now. Authors will often change their minds as their stories develop.	Write the solution to the problem.	Read through your work and check that it is clear and makes good sense.
Friday 8th January 2021	To write an ending	The solution is rarely the actual end to the story. Mr Wolf may have made the pancakes successfully but there was a twist at the end. He ate all the people who didn't help him. Think about how you will write your ending.	Write the ending to your story.	Read through your work and check that it is clear and makes good sense
