### Dear Parents/Carers

Thank you for everything you are all doing to support your children and the staff with the home learning during this challenging time. We very much appreciate all the time and effort that you are all putting into keeping learning going.

As you know, reading is essential to all learning and it needs to remain a priority even during these difficult times. The National Literacy Trust carried out some research after the first Lockdown and found that children's enjoyment of reading had increased with a third of children saying they were reading more. Half the children surveyed had read books that were new to them and many had discovered new and exciting books they had never tried before. Importantly, a third of children highlighted reading as being essential to their well-being and half explained how reading encouraged them to dream about the future. This is all very positive. We know how much our children love books and the wonderful life long experience of reading.

We want to encourage the children to continue to love their reading during Lockdown as much as we can and we know, with the libraries shut and schools closed to most children, this can be challenging.

The staff are enjoying seeing and hearing about all the different reading opportunities the children are making the most of, whether it be sharing stories with their classes during Zoom meetings, sending their teachers photos of themselves snuggled up with their favourite books or engaging in the year group Zoom reading sessions.

I thought it might be useful to make you aware of opportunities and resources that are available to children so that they may continue to enjoy books and love the experience of reading for pleasure at this time.

### **Reading on Zoom**

All year groups are running Zoom sessions in order to teach reading. Links have been sent out for these sessions. If you experience any difficulty joining these sessions please get in touch with your child's teacher who will be able to provide you with the necessary details.

## KS2 https://readtheory.org/

This is an American online reading tool, which provides levelled texts and comprehension questions. It's free to create an account and quickly assesses your child's reading level to select appropriate texts. The wide-ranging bank of texts is very interesting and informative and includes non-fiction as well as fiction. Comprehension is tested with fun multiple choice quizzes and pupils receive immediate feedback, which explains why answers selected are right or wrong. They earn points for correct answers and can move up levels as they progress. When we have used this in school, we have found that pupils find it motivating and enjoyable.

Children can listen to poetry by a whole range of poets. You can filter age group and themes. There are also fascinating interviews with a variety of poets, so children can listen to them talking about the poetry they like, why they like to write, the writing process from initial inspiration to the published book. It's great to put a face to some of the poets that children are familiar with and there are some great questions with fascinating answers.
