- Standard methods of international travel – plane, train, boat.

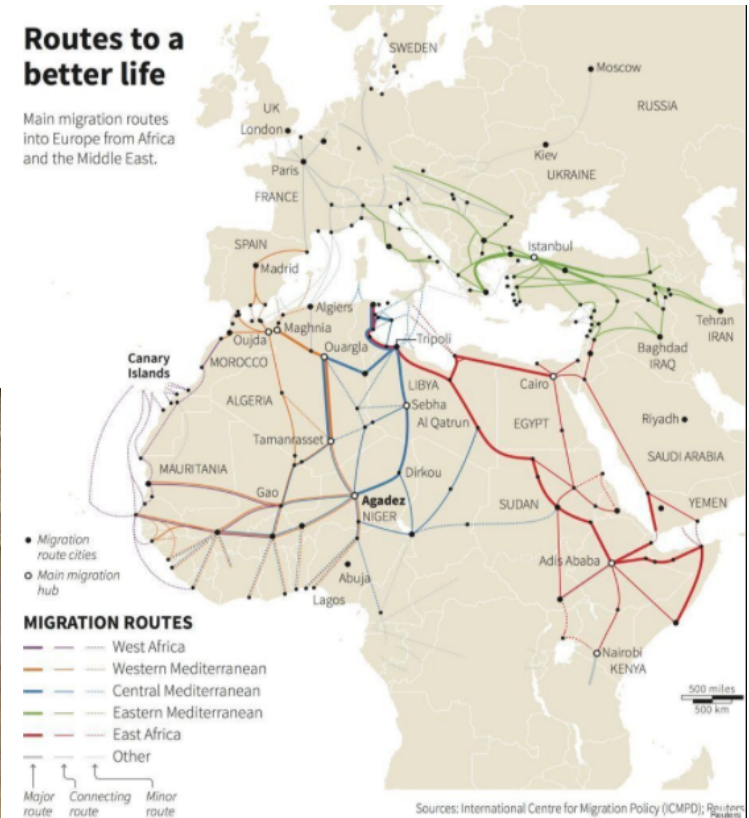
belonging	To be a part of a member of something, or to be in the correct place. A sense of belonging is to feel accepted as a part of a group
migrate	To move from one country, place or location to another.
immigrant	A person who comes to another country to live.
citizen	A member of a place (town, city, country). A global citizen is a citizen of the world.
refugee	A person who flees for safety, especially from a foreign country.
asylum	A place of safety. Protection given, especially to political refugees.
integrate	To become part of a larger whole.
assimilate	To take something and make it part of the thing it has joined
persecute	To treat continually in a way meant to be cruel or harmful. In particular, to cause to suffer because of belief.
Samaritan	A charitable or helpful person

What is an asylum seeker?

Someone who has arrived in a country and asked for asylum. Until they receive a decision as to whether or not they are a refugee, they are known as an asylum seeker. In the UK, this means they do not have the same rights as a refugee or a British citizen would. For example, people seeking asylum aren't allowed to work. ([Refugee Action](#), 2016)
