
What we have been up to this week...

In Year 5/6 our art topic is all about insects, we have borrowed some resin insects from a local museum and then spent time sketching an observational drawing of the insects using pencil.










What we have been up to this week...

Can I ride my e-scooter to school or work?

No, it's Illegal.

E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles and are required to be taxed and insured. It's not possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters, which means it's illegal to use them.

Can I ride my e-scooter on the pavement?

No, it's Illegal...

You cannot use e-scooters on public footpaths, cycle lanes or roads.

What happens if I'm caught using my e-scooter in public spaces?

The scooter may be seized and as a result, destroyed.

If stopped by an officer, you may be asked to complete a breath and drugs test. You also risk a £300 fine and six penalty points on your licence for no insurance.



Think before you buy:

This year's theme, Story Garden, invites children aged 4 to 11 to explore the magical connection between storytelling and nature.

Children can sign up and take part in the Challenge at any library in Kent or mobile library. They will receive a folder to track their reading and earn milestone incentives. Alternatively, children can sign up and take part in the Challenge online. Online participants can set their own reading goals, read any books they like, and unlock digital rewards.

After completing the Challenge online, children can visit any library in Kent to collect their medal and certificate.

Children participating in the Summer Reading Challenge at any Kent Library will receive incentives to keep them motivated:

- · Stickers to decorate their folder.
- A bookmark after reading two books.
- A packet of seeds after reading four books.
- A medal and certificate upon completing the Challenge by reading six books.

- · Boosting reading skills and confidence
- · Encouraging a love for reading
- Preventing the summer reading dip
- Fostering creativity and imagination
- · Providing family bonding opportunities.
